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The current situation in the U.K. regarding the 70mm presentations focusses on London as being the city where you can usually, though certainly not always, find a cinema showing a 70mm print.

70mm prints are "rare", generally speaking, with any such provision being given to the major premiere cinemas in the capital and, when that cinema has finished with the print, it then can become available for use around the U.K. By that time, however, the commercial viability of a film has often run its course and there is little or no demand for the print. The National Museum of Photography, Film and Television in Bradford has, in the past, used as many as six 70mm prints in a single month (for single or very short run presentations). During the Autumn the number of 70mm presentations became very few and in November there was only one listed ("Terminator 2 - Judgement Day") and this was published "We HOPE to show a 70mm print". The National Film Theatre in London also pick up occasional 70mm prints but on my last visit to the capital there were no such prints advertised in that month.

Cinemas in London which show 70mm prints at least two or three times each year are:

There are many other cinemas in the capital with 70mm facilities but they are very rarely used.

The Odeon, Marble Arch, used to be the best venue for 70mm presentations with its huge curved Cinerama-type screen. The curved screen was removed for a flat screen in 1990 when the restored "Lawrence of Arabia" was presented there in 70mm. The Dimension 150 lens, leased from the USA, had been returned and David Lean, apparently, would not approve the theatre for his film unless the curved screen was removed. The theatre is still an excellent place for 70mm films though it must be said that the removal of the curved screen has diminished the experience

Typical of many provincial cinemas with 70mm facilities, the new Warner 12-screen multiplex in York, close to where I live, had a 1-day 70mm presentation of "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom" on the FREE pre-opening promotional day and has only had one 70mm print ("Dick Tracy") since it opened two years ago.

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


Thomas Hauerslev, projectionist in Denmark, is busy some years already with a world-wide list of the famous Philips DP70 projector produced in Eindhoven, The Netherlands from 1954 till 1966.

The original "Todd-AO" projector was the Philips all-purpose EL4000/01 DP70. DP means here Double Projector (for 35mm and 70mm films). More than 2500 were built and installed all over the world. Films like "Oklahoma!", "Around the world in 80 days" and "South Pacific" were shown in the first 70 mm process, called "Todd-AO" with stereophonic sound from six magnetic soundtracks on huge curved screens. The projector was the same everywhere: DP70. In USA it became "Norelco AA11" with the nick name Dollar Princess and produced for North American Phillips Company in New York. Oceanliners like "France" had two DP70 installed. The DP70 was very popular and got an Oscar in 1963. However the DP70 was very expensive and in 1967 replaced by DP75, which is still made today.

Early DP70 versions had two motors: one for 24 frames per second and one for 30 fps. The door opened the "wrong" way and the Philips logo was above the door. DP70 was built for 70mm running at 30 fps, but with a few changes the projectionist could change from 70mm to 35mm in less than five minutes. Many cinemas worldwide had DP70's installed and often it is referred to as the Rolls-Royce of projectors. Today DP70 is still around in many cinemas, filmstudios and laboratories.

In the past years we have tried to locate the DP70's which are still in function. Realising the impossibility of the task without help from others we hereby invite everyone everywhere to help to locate this great projector.

We need the serialnumber of each projector, the cinema (or alternative installation, private theatre or museum, etc.) and if it is the left, center or right projector. Any photo of projectors are most welcome. Every contributor will receive the latest run-down.

ALL-TIME BOXOFFICE CHAMPS

1968

Herewith, VARIETY again presents its compilation of All-Time Box office Champion Films. This list repeats many figures as previously published and not since altered by reissue but some figures are revised, upward or downward, from earlier reports. Experience has informed this publication that the All-Time list is most carefully studied by readers who look in vain for films they believe ought surely to be included but are not. Therefore, these reminders are reiterated:

(a) A film, to qualify for inclusion here, must have paid \$4,000,000 in rentals to the distributor.

(b) "Birth of a Nation," released in 1915, which may have grossed as much as \$50,000,000, has always been omitted because it was handled on a states rights and, often, an outright cash sale basis, hence data are unreliable.

(c) Figures, as given below, signify the rentals received by the distributors from the U.S.-Canada market only and omit foreign market rentals. The latter, in recent years, frequently equal or surpass the domestic playoff.

A sizable contingent of past releases is round-figure estimated at \$4,000,000 or close enough thereto, though more exact data would be distinctly preferable. There is a great reluctance on the part of most film companies to revise figures once they have passed their first flush of success (with the exception of major reissues) although many of the films have stayed in circulation, more or less, for years, been resold sporadically, and have added some income over the years.

Note: Film title is followed by name of director, producer, or production company; original distributing company plus present distributor, if different (plus differing U.S. and Canadian distribs in case of some foreign-made films); year of release; as well as total rentals received to date.)
