

UK PREMIERE

IN BRUGES

Friday 29 February Pictureville Cinema

Dir. Martin McDonough GB/Belgium 2007 107 mins (18 Colin Farrell, Brendan Gleeson, Ralph Fiennes, Clémence Poésy, Jérémie Rénier, Thekla Reuten, Jordan Prentice, Ciarán Hinds

When a job goes badly wrong, veteran hitman Ken (Gleeson) and his rookie partner Ray (Farrell) are sent by their sinister boss, Harry (Fiennes), from London to the storybook Flemish city of Bruges to cool their heels. The city's medieval grace and character soon has them living the life of tourists but, always, they await word from Harry that will switch them back into killing mode. And when the call does finally come, Ken and Ray's vacation becomes a life-anddeath struggle of darkly comic proportions and surprisingly emotional consequences. In Bruges is the debut feature film from acclaimed playwright Martin McDonough whose Oscar-winning short Six Shooter was screened during BIFF2005. Packed equally with spiky profanity and rich, edgy humour, it signals the emergence of a major new talent.

On the border between Utah and Arizona, the vast landscapes around Monument Valley are tied to classic tales of Western vengeance. Former child actors Fred and Mel have an old score to settle, and their skewed journey towards a remarkable Valley showdown is stuffed full of movie-fan fun and games. Fred and Mel's nemesis is cruel screenwriter Fritz Frobisher, who bullied the young stars back in the day. He's due any day now at a public appearance, and so with Mel's unimpressed daughter in tow, the three set out to "kick his ass". On their journey through the South western states, everything from Charles Bronson's career to the distant War on Terror gets filtered through a gauze of movie obsession. Alex Cox's new film is a homage to American movies that finds mirth within the myth.

We hope writer/director Alex Cox will be able to join us for the UK Premiere of his latest film.

Elderly Traude Krüger visits
Luckau prison, as she has done
every morning since 1944, to
teach the inmates how to play
the piano. Jenny is a volatile
young convicted murderer. As
Traude gets to know her she finds
out more about Jenny's secret
and decides to turn her into the
great player she never became.
A moving and telling story, with
excellent performances.

UK PREMIERE

ALL THE INVISIBLE THINGS

Sunday 2 March

Michael Sauseng, Simon Mostl Angelika Schneider

A scintillatingly confident debut from a writer/director still only in his mid-20s, this grittily urban tale of youth disorder and family strife injects familiar-sounding material with a rare urgency and freshness. Bold in form and strikingly vivid in content, the multi award-winning drama is by far the most startling thing to come out of Graz since California's current governor.

BAD GIRLS (Niñas Mal)

Tuesday 11 March

Dir. Fernando Sariñana Mexico 2007 103 mins (adv 15) Subtitle. Martha Hiaareda. Camila Sodi

Adela Léon proudly boasts three tattoos, a body piercing and has recently been arrested for bad behaviour. Afraid the image of his beloved daughter will tarnish his campaign to become governor of Mexico City, her father enrols her at the city's most prestigious school for girls.

BEHIND FORGOTTEN EYES

Sunday 2 March

Narrated by Yunjin Kim An extraordinary documentary about an almost-forgotten period in history. When Japan occupied Korea during World War II, the crimes of the occupying troops were horrifying. Anthony Gilmore uses animation to create a sense of innocence around those young women who became sex slaves to troops and contrasts with the testament of the women today. Very moving and shocking.

UK PREMIERE BELLAVISTA

Thursday 6 March

Dir. Peter Schreiner Austria 2007 117 mins (adv 12A) Subtitles

Documentaries simply don't come any more sensitive or poetic than this. In a remote corner of northern Italy where a German dialect is still spoken by the older residents, we meet a middle-aged woman scarred physically and psychologically by life's vagaries. An intense, quietly philosophical exploration of darkness and light.

EUROPEAN PREMIERE BOXING DAY

Saturday 1 March

Over a single day - and through what looks, in a display of technical bravura that will make your head spin, like a single unbroken shot - we follow a grizzled Adelaide ex-con through his valiant attempts to stay on the straight and narrow. A tough, uncompromising, Loachian drama of gripping intensity.

BUNNY CHOW

Sunday 2 March

92 mins (adv 12A) This South African road movie focuses on three aspiring comedians who set off for the Oppikoppi rock festival in the hope that they will get their chance to perform. The three leads each have their own problems - from stage fright to infidelity but the journey may teach them something about themselves.

BURKE & WILLS

Saturday 15 March

Bracingly unconventional in several different ways (most obviously the daringly experimental approaches to editing and music), this shoestring-budgeted oddity begins as a quietly hilarious comedy about a pair of mismatched Sydney housemates before darkening radically (and nightmarishly) in tone all the way to a shocking finale. A startling example of low-cash, high-risk cinema

CARAMEL (Sukkar banat)

Wednesday 5 March

A delightful romantic comedy that revolves around five women in a beauty salon in Beirut. Owner Layale is at the tail-end of an affair, her breaking heart supported by salon colleagues Nisrine and Rima. Meanwhile, one her clients is preparing to marry. Funny and touching, Caramel is an enjoyable and uplifting ensemble movie.

CITY OF MEN

Friday 14 March

Based upon the remarkable City of God, City of Men is a far less vicious but emotionally satisfying drama. Acerola and Laranjinha are young men from the slums and Acerola is about to marry the long-suffering Cris. They already have a baby. While fatherless from a gang shooting, Acerola is coming to terms with being a parent, while Laranjinha is looking for his own long-time absent father.

THE COTTAGE

Thursday 6 March

From the director of London to Brighton, The Cottage is a horror comedy that centres on a couple of kidnappers hiding out in a cottage in the woods with their hostage. What they don't know is that another cottage is host to a psychopath. Borrowing liberally from the genre, The Cottage will compete with Shaun of the Dead as one of Britain's favourite horrors as the cult grows.

UK PREMIERE COWBOY ANGELS

Wednesday 12 March

Thierry Levaret, Diego Mestanza, Françoise Klein, Noëlie Giraud Driving from urban Paris blues to the gradually warming Spanish coast, 11-year-old Pablo and his mercenary chauffeur Louis escape their woes, and search for better days. Soon this odd couple might find what's been missing from their lives. But first they have some estranged relatives to meet

Like John Carpenter's In the Mouth of Madness, this clammily inventive chiller is more a tribute to legendary horror writer H.P. Lovecraft than an actual adaptation of his work. It's the dark tale of a troubled man who returns home to find himself entangled in a nightmare that may have apocalyptic consequences.

DOG DAYS DREAM

Big city heat – Japanese style - in this gloriously screwball/deadpan comedy in which a mismatched young couple make their way through the modern urban jungle. He's so lazy that she has to brush his teeth for him - but their quest for a decent air conditioning unit leads to unexpected role reversals. A sweetly quirky delight.

EMMA'S BLISS

The ways of the city and the country collide - literally - with bittersweet results in this weirdly wonderful blend of romance, comedy and tragedy. It's the story of independent but cashstrapped farmer Emma and what happens when car dealer Max comes crashing into her life one dark and stormy night.

Following the huge arthouse hit of Hidden, Michael Haneke has returned to his earlier film Funny Games and remade it, transposing the location from Europe to Long Island, New York.

When David starts work at a local garage he changes the life of co-worker Josie for ever.

to anyone who wants to know
where the '80s went.

the Real Girl is both bizarre and
charming.

Now she turns to costume drama set in Paris, 1835, with an adaptation of the novel by Jules Barbey d'Aurevilly. On the eve of his wedding to the much younger Hermangarde, notorious libertine Ryno de Marigny confesses his past affairs to her grandmother.

THE LIGHTHOUSE

Saturday 1 March

Dir. Maria Saakyan Russia 2006 78 mins (adv 15) Subtitles Anna Kapaleva, Sofico Chiairelli,

Armenian-born, Russian-raised Saakyan pays lavish tribute to her nations' cinematic legends Paradjanov and Tarkovsky with this genuinely poetic vision of a nation ravaged by war. Her focus is on the women and children "left behind" at home. Heart-stoppingly beautiful and thunderously intense, it's a debut which promises (and indeed achieves) great things.

UK PREMIERE LITTLE MOTH

Dir. Tao Peng China 2007 99 mins (adv 15) Subtitle: Huihui Zhao, Dequn Han, Lei 7hana

This harrowing tale of child exploitation - praised as one of the finest Chinese films of recent years - has been likened to Dickens and the Dardenne Brothers for its "anger and storytelling scope", and its "documentary-influenced immediacy and sensitive gaze". A pressingly topical, rigorously unsentimental story that pulls no punches.

MID-AFTERNOON BARKS

This summer's Beijing Olympics is turning the world's eyes firmly towards China, with unprecedented attention being paid to the country's vibrant artistic scene(s). In terms of cinematic rising stars, look no further than Zhang Yuedong: his debut is an audaciously avant-garde, accessibly absurdist, visually remarkable triptych that quietly but clearly announces the arrival of a major new talent.

MILKY WAY

From a young Hungarian director already well on his way to cult status, an unclassifiable, experimental - but surprisingly accessible - walk on the wilder side of the human imagination. Who needs dialogue when you have such remarkable images and such eloquent sounds? It's like nothing else you'll see - or hear - all year.

THE OPERATING THEATRE: JOURNEY INTO SURGERY (Le Théâtre des opérations)

Thursday 13 March

Dir. Benoît Rossel Switzerland 2007 86 mins (adv 18) Subtitle Documentary with: Professor Michel Gillet, Dr. Nikos Kotzampassakis

This compelling documentary uncovers the inner workings of a hospital operating theatre as it follows a fledgling surgeon at work. Forthright interviews with surgeons on the front line makes for compulsive, though at times uncomfortable and slightly morbid, viewing.

At first, Muslim girl Amina offers merely the means towards his ticket, but strong feelings emerge to rock both their worlds. An ageless problem becomes an affecting tale for our times.

A hit at the Venice Film Festival and a major new motion picture.

RETURN TO GORÉE (Retour à Gorée)

Along the way he performs with many musicians, focusing on the roots of their music in slavery. Very uplifting.

A powerfully acted and vividly atmospheric slice of life... and death.





During the latter decades of the Victorian Era, the great Paris Opera is troubled with whispers of a ghost - a frightening spectre that visits misfortune on the company should they fail to please him.

Up-and-coming singer Christine Daae (Mary Philbin), meanwhile, is more preoccupied with her singing tutor. He is a disembodied voice she believes to be an emissary from her dead father, who guides her to new heights but demands she put her music above all else, including (and especially) her handsome childhood sweetheart, Raoul. Neither Phantom nor tutor is a spirit in truth, but are two different sides of the same man: a horribly disfigured, unnaturally gifted and frighteningly passionate man, but a man nonetheless.

Cipher – saxophonist/flautist Theo Travis and bassist Dave Sturt – have been reinventing music for silent films for live performance since 1996. Their acclaimed scores include Pabst's Pandora's Box, Murnau's The Last Laugh and two Hitchcock classics: The Lodger and Blackmail.




