





Located in New Farm, an inner-city suburb of Brisbane, the theatre opened late 1921 as the Merthyr Picture Palace. Originally an "open-air" venue, the theatre was acquired by Richard Francis Stephens and Charles Eric Munro in 1924. After Brisbane City Council approved the renovations to the Merthyr Picture Palace in September 1924, the Brisbane architect Claude E Humphreys was commissioned to design additions and alterations to the theatre and was re-named the Astor Theatre reopening in early 1925. Further renovation was undertaken in 1937 to the design of architect George Rae, which provided a seating capacity of 1,145. In 1970 the Astor lease and title were sold to Village Theatres (Brisbane) Proprietary Limited. Shortly after, a second screen was added by way of the original Astor auditorium split in two with a common, back to back projection room; designs for which were prepared by Ron G. Monsbourgh and Associates. Village Twin was equipped with dual 70/35mm Toshiba projectors with xenon in Cinema 1 and Toshiba 35 only projectors with carbon arcs in cinema 2. The Village Twin Cinemas reopened on the 26th December 1970 - the twin cinema complex Oueensland. Cinema One [The Blue Room] had a seating capacity of 555, and Cinema Two [The Purple Room] seated 352. The theatre's first 70mm

film was *Anne of the Thousand Days* (which enjoyed a 17-week season). During the period of the Roadshow Engagement, the Village Twin presented three 70mm openings which included, *Anne of the Thousand Days*, *The Wild Bunch* and *The Three Musketeers*. The Village Twin also presented the successful 19-week season of *Deliverance* in 35mm. *Deliverance* was later reissued in 70mm at capital city theatres around Australia. Village Twin closed in 2003. The site sat dormant until 2013 when it was acquired by the Sourris Brothers, Peter and Stephen. Retaining the heritage listed shell of the Village Twin, the site was converted into a six-screen complex with the then demolished main auditorium [cinema 1], becoming five screens and the old cinema 2, becoming the main auditorium of the six-screen cinema complex. Currently the cinema complex is managed and operated by the Sourris Family.
