Todd Talks On Russian Venture

Mike Todd hosted some 25 news-men with a private press-luncheon at the Beverly Hills Hotel and talked en-thusiastically on his recent Russian trip and his five - picture deal with the Soviets

Soviets.

Todd said he would not start shooting "War and Peace," tentatively scheduled as one of the five pictures, until he is assured, on paper, that he will have complete command. "If I were prompted by the profit motive, and you know how I like a buck, I could have signed for it before I left Russia."

He tabbed as a resease the

Russia."

He tabbed as erroneous the report that his "Around the World in 80 Days" would world premiere in Moscow. "It opens here in September and the Moscow date is Nov. 15."

That the Soviets have everything we have, at least on paper, amazed him. "They even have a blue-print of my Todd-AO process in minute detail. This I saw with my own eyes." He was especially impressed with the Russ color movie "Othello," which he reportedly will release outside the Soviet orbit.

Relative to his "unlimited budget" he explained, "If I want 40,000 horsemen, they press a button, I get it." When asked if this might include slave labor he said, "The minute I see one slave laborer, I stop shooting the same dav"

Leaving for New York June 10, he expects to start his first Russ picture, a melange of Russian entertainment, June 15.
